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1. CLOTHING & EQUIPMENT

A few items to include when packing for your trip:

- Warm clothes the weather is expected to hover around 6°C to 7°C, but temperatures could drop below 0 as well. We recommend you bring a good winter coat, shoes with thick soles and an umbrella in case it rains. There is no formal dress code for the school, but most participants opt for a business casual look.
- Your own computer/tablet/notebook.
- Travel adaptors plug types C and E are used in Belgium. See <u>here</u> for more information.
- Bring your business cards for the various networking events we are organising.
- Bring your passport for visits to European institutions.

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2. INFORMATION CENTRES & CONNECTIVITY

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2.1. BRUSSELS TOURIST INFORMATION

If you are coming early, or staying afterwards, and want to do some sightseeing, we recommend downloading the My Brussels app to get more information about life in the city.

We also recommend visiting the website <u>Visit.Brussels</u> to get acquainted with the city – what to do, shows and activities, and more.

Additionally, you can find tourist information centres at the airport, central and midi train stations, the European Parliament and the Grand Place.

2.2. TELEPHONE AND WIFI

You can buy a prepaid Belgian sim card (if your phone allows for it) from almost any provider. You will be able to find them at the airport in the Carrefour, <u>Proximus</u> and BASE stores.

There is free WIFI at the airport in case you want to download the map to your destination from the airport. Follow these instructions to access the WIFI.

WIFI is also wide-spread across the city, as well in most of our study locations. Read more information on public WIFI.

3.2. ARRIVING AT THE AIRPORT

There are many ways to get to the city centre from the Brussels Zaventem Airport.


Train: This is the recommended option to travel from the airport to the city centre. The train from Brussels Zaventem Airport to Brussels Central Station departs every 10 minutes between 5.00 am and midnight. The ride takes 17–18 minutes and costs approx. €14.

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Bus: All airport buses depart and arrive at the bus station at Level 0. The Airport Line is a public transport airport bus that will take you to the city centre. There are two buses: Line 12 and Line 21. There will be delays if the bus is caught in traffic and there is limited space for luggage. Download the $\underline{\text{De Lijn}}$ app to pay €1.8 or have €3 in change at hand to pay on the bus.

Taxi: A taxi from the airport to the city centre costs around €46. Look for the blue taxis with a yellow logo – these are the official ones. Taxis are available outside the terminal, facing the Arrivals Hall. Call the numbers below to pre-book a taxi. You can also get assistance at the airport to book one, or grab an Uber.

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3.3. PARTNER CENTRES

Bruegel

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Here is how to get there from the central train station.


Metro: From Brussel Centraal Station take metro numbers 1 or 5 to Arts-Loi/Kunst-Wet and walk about 3 minutes. The journey takes a total of 6 minutes. See metro routes: www.stib-mivb.be/irj/go/km/docs/horaires/5/schema/20221105/5_1.gif

Bus: From Brussel Centraal Station take bus numbers 29 or 63 to Madou and walk about 2 minutes. The journey takes a total of 12 minutes and these buses are available every 5 minutes. Alternatively, from Brussel Centraal Station take bus numbers 65 or 66 to Sint-Joost-ten-Node Madou and walk about 4 minutes. The journey takes a total of 14 minutes as these buses have been rerouted due to maintenance.

Walk: 17 minutes to Bruegel from Brussel Centraal Station.

European Policy Centre (EPC)

The school will be held at EPC on Thursday 2 Feb and Friday 3 Feb morning. The address is: 14–16 rue du Trône, 1000 Brussels.



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
Here is how to get there from the central train station.

Bus: From Brussel Centraal Station take bus numbers 71 or 38 to Troon and walk about 2 minutes. The journey takes a total of 9–10 minutes and these buses are available every 4–7 minutes.

Walk: 16 minutes to EPC from Brussel Centraal Station.

Centre for Africa-Europe Relations (ECDPM)

The school will be held at ECDPM on Friday 3 Feb evening and Saturday 4 Feb. The address is: Avenue des Arts 44, 1000 Brussels.



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Here is how to get there from the central train station.

Train: From Brussel Centraal Station take metro numbers 1 or 5 to Arts-Loi/Kunst-Wet and walk about 5 minutes. The journey takes a total of 10 minutes. See metro routes: www.stib-mivb.be/irj/go/km/docs/horaires/5/schema/20221105/5_1.gif

Bus: From Brussel Centraal Station take bus number 71 to Troon and walk about 5 minutes. The journey takes a total of 12 minutes and these buses are available every 6 minutes. Alternatively, from Brussel Centraal Station take bus number 38 to Troon and walk about 5 minutes. The journey takes a total of 12 minutes and these buses are available every 10 minutes.

Walk: 13 minutes to ECDPM from Brussel Centraal Station.

4.1. WHERE TO EAT


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Information: Open every day (12.00 pm - 7.00 pm).

Travel: 10-minute walk from Motel One.




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Les Brassins: Head over here for authentic Belgian cuisine and a selection of Belgian beers! Prices vary, but meat items are generally more expensive. The restaurant is cosy and located close to the European Policy Centre (an 11-minute walk).




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Information: Open from Tuesday to Friday (12.00 pm – 2.30 pm and 6.30 pm – 10.30 pm). On Saturdays, they are open for longer hours (12.00 pm – 10.30 pm). Travel: Take tram numbers 92 or 93 from Motel One (point Parc) to Stéphanie and walk about 7 minutes.



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Bia Mara: Hailed as the best fish and chips spot in Brussels! Bia Mara began as a market stall in Dublin and in 2012 set up shop in Brussels. It's a good little spot to grab a quick, affordable bite and indulge in your fish 'n' chips cravings. The menu is based on the catch of the day.



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

Maison Antoine: The best place to have classic Belgian fries (frites) – even




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Information: Open throughout the week from 11.30 am to 1.00 am. Address: Pl. Jourdan 1, 1040 Etterbeek, Belgium.

Travel: From Motel One, walk 4 minutes to the Parc tram stop and take tram number 5 to Schuman. Walk 11 minutes.

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
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Nona: They serve authentic Italian pizzas and use organic ingredients from Belgian farmers.





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L'Express: A great place to have quick, budget-friendly and tasty Lebanese, Mediterranean, Middle Eastern food! They also have some options for vegetarians.





4.2. WHERE TO HAVE A DRINK

Delirium Café is claimed to have the world's largest selections of beer.

<u>Madame Moustache</u> is a quirky, whimsical bar with a circus-style carriage, barber-shop room, foosball table and live music.

Zodiak is nightclub popular for electronic dance music (EDM).

Information: Open on Friday – Sunday (times vary, but usually open after 11.00 pm or 12.00 am).

<u>The Green Man Cocktail bar</u> is the go-to place for a great selection of beautifully presented and delicious cocktails. They serve beer as well.

Bar des Amis has a vintage feel and a great atmosphere.

4.3. THINGS TO SEE OR DO

Join us on Sunday 29 Jan for a walking tour to get acquainted with the city.

Place de Lux is the ideal place to grab a drink on a Thursday night if you want to interact with parliamentary assistants! It's also a good space to network and discuss politics in Europe.

Cycle around <u>Bois de la Cambre</u>, one of largest parks in the Brussels capital region. But do check the weather before renting a bicycle from the city! You can also visit other parks such as the **Royal Park**, the largest park in the city.

Parc du Cinquantenaire is another beautiful park to visit if the weather is good. The French-style gardens and museums at the site offer a great space to have a picnic, enjoy the scenery or learn about history.

Comic lovers can visit the **Comics Art Museum** to learn about history of comics and illustration.

If you like 'Bond, James Bond', do visit the very first **Bond in Motion** exhibition at the Brussels Expo! The exhibition will feature well-known props and 45 original vehicles from the James Bond movies. Check the <u>ticket prices</u> and exhibition dates before you visit.
